#### 1.0 Introduction

The Research and Consultation Centre was established on the 1st of May 1986. On the 1st of January 2006, the centre was merged with the Publishing, Broadcasting, and Media Technology Division and renamed the Department of Research and Innovation. On 1st of January 2008, after a restructuring exercise, the department was renamed as the Research and Innovation Management Centre (RIMC).

RIMC's role is to manage, motivate, and stimulate research among academicians to increase the overall productivity of the University, by helping to produce impactful publication through research, increased participation, and quality research output.

#### 1.1. Vision

To drive the management discipline towards human development that ensures the sustainability of faith, nation, and country through excellence in research and innovation.

#### 1.2. Mission

To lead in research management that facilitates the formation and transfer of knowledge in the disciplines of social sciences and management.

#### 1.3. Objective

- To promote cooperation between the University and other outside organisations especially in the fields of research, consultation, and innovation;
- To involve the University in national development through the academic staff of the University as a consultant in national development projects;
- To encourage the academic staff of the University to involve themselves in the activities of research, consultation, and innovation to gain experience and further strengthen their expertise in their respective fields;
- To coordinate and identify the activities of research and innovation carried out by the academic staff of the University; and
- To promote cooperation between academic staff from various disciplines at the University in carrying out the activities of research.

# 2.0 Organisational Structure and Function

This section describes the structure and function of the organisation under the office of the Research and Innovation Management Centre (RIMC), the research ecosystem, Centres of Excellence (CoE), Research Units, and Niche Areas of research.

Structure and functions of the organisation describe the role of all entities under the office of the RIMC and those associated with it.




Figure 1 Organisational Structure of RIMC

#### 2.1. Research and Innovation Management Centre (RIMC)

RIMC consists of four main units, namely the Research Unit, Research Publication Unit, Special Task Unit, and the Administration and Finance Unit. Table 1 describes the main functions of the RIMC.

# 2.2. Innovation and Commercialisation Centre (ICC)

In addition to RIMC, ICC serves to enhance collaborative research with public agencies and the private sector, particularly for new grants, industrial relations, and commercialised research results. Starting in January 2016, ICC had taken over RIMC functions in terms of the Intellectual Property (IP) management and commercialisation activities.

#### 2.3. Committee for Research and Innovation (JKPI)

The function of the Research and Innovation Committee is to interpret and implement the policies of research, publication, and innovation of the University, and as such, it has to consider and approve:

- a. the research, publication, and innovation grants for academic staff of the University,
- b. the final report of an investigation that has expired / has been completed; and
- c. the extension of the investigation period and transfer or allocation of research funds.

In 2017, this committee had met six times. Table 2 lists some of the major decisions made by the committee.

Strategic research initiatives and networks build on areas of existing research strength by bringing together a critical mass of expertise from across the Schools, with four key aims: to address large-scale multi-disciplinary research challenges; to increase the capacity to influence national and international research, policy, and funding agendas; to strengthen internal cross-disciplinary research collaborations; and to provide a platform for large-scale funding applications, recruitments, and international research partnerships. 


Figure 2 UUM's Research Niche Areas

#### 2.6. Research Governance

#### 3.0 Management of Research Input

This chapter reports the fund-raising activities and acquisition of research, procurement of government, private, and international grants, and financial research management.

#### 3.1. Generation and Acquisition of Research Funds




Figure 3 Main Sources for Research Funds for UUM for 2017

UUM obtains funds through three main sources, namely through government grants, private grants, and international grants. The government grants here are defined to include both external and internal sources. The total amount received in 2017 (as of 18<sup>th</sup> April 2018) stands at RM11,300,411.88 funding 369 research projects for that year. The funds were divided into government grants consisting of RM6,967,159.60 for 49 projects from external government agencies, RM2,610,500.00 financing 285 projects from university grants, followed by international grants totalling RM1,087,449.28 for 18 projects, while private grants totalled 635,303.00 for 17 projects. The percentages of funding are as in Figure 3.

# 3.2. Procurement of Government Grants

In 2017, the highest turnover of government grants was received from the Ministry of Higher Education (MOHE) totalling for 49 research projects at RM6,967,159.60, followed by Construction Industry Development Board (CIDB) at RM89,520.00. Table 5 shows the sources of government grant revenue for 2017, while Table 6 illustrates the government grant revenue breakdown by UUM departments (PTJ).

The top five highest recipient of government grants was School of Quantitative Sciences at RM3,008,560.00, followed by School of Languages, Civilisation, and Philosophy at RM2,053,000.00, School of Computing at RM456,330.00, School of Business Management at RM273,333.00 and School of International Studies at RM203,790.00. The highest number of grants awarded was to School of Computing with seven (7) projects.

MOHE approved a total allocation of RM4,595,422.60 in 2017 to fund 33 projects, of which were RM4,860,000.00 for a Top-Down project, RM1,571,375.40 for 28 Fundamental Research Grant Scheme (FRGS) projects, RM131,187.20 for 2 Knowledge Transfer Programme (KTP) and RM32,860.00 funded a Prototype Research Grant Scheme (PRGS) projects. Details are shown in Table 7.

# 3.4. Procurement of International Grants

Revenue for international grants in 2017 were acquired via 18 projects with a total of RM1,087,449.28. Turnover was highest for two Erasmus projects with RM452,896.95 for Erasmus Higher Education International Capacity Building and RM186,534.00 for Erasmus Charter for Education (EU Grant), followed by Transparency International with a project totalling RM105,000.00.

# 3.5. Disbursement of University Research Funds

A total of RM2,610,500.00 research funding was disbursed for 2017 through 285 projects from various grants approved by the University. 2017 saw the continuation of the university funded Development Grants created as an effort to help increase the number of researchers (Principal Investigators) among UUM lecturers. Through this programme, another 107 were added previous approved 139 projects with a total amount of RM930,000.00 or 36% of the total grants disbursed. The highest recipient of the university grants was the School of Computing with total funds received at RM365,000.00, followed by School of Quantitative Sciences at RM360,000.00, School of Technology Management and Logistics at RM345,000.00, Tunku Puteri Intan Safinaz School of Accounting at RM222,500.00, and School of International Studies at 170,000.00. The highest number of grants awarded was to the Tunku Puteri Intan Safinaz School of Accounting at 38 projects.

# 3.6. Management of University Research Funds

University Research funds, an allocation of RM3,758,977.93, was approved for 2016 by MOHE. During this period, a total of RM3,024,255.09 or 80.5% was spent to finance research projects, namely Talent Development (RM298,453.51), Research Prominence (RM2,132,836.75), Wealth Creation (RM514,964.83), and Bridging the Grand Challenge (RM78,000.00). These funds were received and distributed according to the needs of the activities under MyRA and monitored by MOHE (refer to Figure 7).





Figure 5 Breakdown of MyRA Funds Approved and Spending for 2017




Figure 7 UUM Intellectual Property Registration for 2015-2017

Publishing is one of the key performance indicators of a university. UUM's management must think and formulate various methods in terms of strategy, policies, and related action plans to increase the number of publications in indexed and high impact journals.

In 2017, UUM successfully issued 803 documents in Scopus/WoS/ERA publications, including proceedings contributing 29% to the number of publications between the years 2015 to 2017, as shown in Figure 8 and Table 16.

#### **Publication Incentive**

Various initiatives and incentives had been introduced to generate publications and encourage lecturers to produce publications. Among them is the provision of financial rewards (Figure 9).

#### Issuance of Incentive Scheme

- i. Publication Incentive Scheme for Journal Articles, Books, and Chapters in Book. The main aim of establishing this scheme is to give incentive or reward to UUM academic members who have written and published journal articles, books, and chapters in books to assist in increasing the number of publications. For 2017, as many as 711 applications were approved to receive this publication incentive, totalling RM414,373.25.
- ii. Payment Scheme for Journal Publication Fees (SPYPJ) The payment scheme for journal publication fees (SPYPJ) is a scheme to encourage and reward UUM academic staff to improve the statistics of publication of journal articles, primarily in WoS / Scopus indexed journals.

For the duration of 2017, 75 applications were received for approval and totalled RM99,119.21.

# The 9<sup>th</sup> International Conference and Exposition on Inventions by Institutions of Higher Learning (PECIPTA) 2017

In 2017, UUM participated in the International Conference and Exposition on Inventions by Institutions of Higher Learning (PECIPTA) which was held from 7th to 9th October 2017 with the theme "Nurturing Entrepreneurs through Education, Industry, Technology and Social Innovation". PeCIPTA 2017 organized by MOHE in collaboration with Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (UMT) and Universiti Sultan Zainal Abidin (UniSZA) was officiated by the Higher Education Minister, the honorable Dato 'Seri Idris Jusoh.

A total of 89 gold medals, 96 silver medals and 183 bronze medals were awarded to researchers as well as special awards to 12 products out of the 416 innovation products that have been featured, of which UUM won two gold medals, four silver medals and seven bronze medals.

#### 5.0 Summary of Research Performance

#### 5.1. MyRA Performance Indicators

MyRA is an online system which was developed to enable Public Institutions of Higher Learning (IPTA) and Private Institutions of Higher Learning (IPTS) class universities and colleges to make a self-assessment of their research achievements of research, development, and commercialisation (R&D&C). The Malaysian government gives priority to R&D&C activities conducted by local universities to develop the national economy. MOHE create MyRA instruments to enable the university to evaluate the performance of local public and private institutions in terms of R&D&C.

The MyRA instrument is divided into seven sections (Figure 13 and Table 23). Each section has its own weightage which contributes to the overall 100%.




Figure 10 MyRA Instrument Criteria Weightage
